

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Thematic Curriculum

Session I (June 1-12): Mission: Problem Solve

An interactive, experience-based summer theme designed to help children build critical thinking, emotional resilience, creativity, and teamwork through meaningful age-appropriate challenges. Students will explore challenging scenarios such as: Your friend does not want to play with you. You think the teacher is being unfair. A person in your group is not doing their part. A task feels too hard and you don't think you can do it. You feel overwhelmed because you have homework, a project, and an activity on the same day. You have planned a beautiful birthday party, but got sick the night before. You get lost at an amusement park. You hurt yourself on a hike. What are some basic skills needed to survive outdoors? How can you test ideas, adapt to changes, learn from mistakes, stay persistent and adjust your approach when problems happen? Through these experiences, children learn how to problem-solve thoughtfully, communicate effectively, and persevere with confidence.

Session II (June 15-26): Global Sports: More Than a Game

This session invites students to explore how sports unite people, cultures, and ideas around the world—while building skills that extend far beyond the playing field. Students will investigate essential questions such as: What are major global sporting events, and how often do they take place? Who contributes behind the scenes beyond the athletes? How do sports bring communities and countries together? Which sport do you connect with most, and what role do you play on a team? As students explore a variety of global sports, they will examine equipment and rules, experiment with movement, force, and speed through science and physics, and use math and data to analyze scores, standings, and performance. Through this theme, students come to understand that sports are more than competition—they are powerful teachers of character, connection, and global understanding.

Session III (June 29-July 10): From Independence to Innovation: America's 250-Year Story

Students will explore what defines America by traveling through its past, present, and future. Through hands-on projects, discussions, and creative inquiry, students examine how the ideas of independence, freedom, and responsibility have shaped our nation. Students will explore essential questions such as: What does independence mean, and why did the colonies seek it? How has the meaning of independence changed over time? Which values and ideas have endured, and which have evolved as America has grown? As they study key moments in history, students learn how change often brings both opportunity and challenge—and why progress can include conflict, debate, and growth. The students will gain a deeper understanding of how the past influences their lives today—and how they can help shape a thoughtful, responsible, and innovative future as active citizens.

Session IV (July 13-31): Broadway Bound! Writers' Workshop

Immerse yourself in the magic of storytelling and performance, explore how ideas become stories—and how stories come alive on stage. Through writing, collaboration, and performance, students experience the full creative journey from imagining a story to sharing it with an audience. Students will explore essential questions such as: What makes a story engaging? How do writers create strong characters, meaningful settings, and compelling plots? How does dialogue reveal a character's thoughts, motivations, and relationships? As students write, revise, and perform their own scripts, they discover how performers use voice, movement, and expression to bring words to life and communicate meaning clearly and creatively. The students will learn about the many roles behind a successful production—writers, directors, producers, stage crew—and how teamwork makes storytelling possible. The students will build creativity, communication skills, confidence, and a deeper appreciation for the power of storytelling and performance.
